- A. God envisioned the churches a place of...
 - 1. Close brotherhood
 - 2. unity
 - 3. harmony
 - 4. a shining light of righteousness in a world of darkness
 - 5. Isa. 11:1-10
 - 6. Jer. 31:27-34
 - 7. John 17:20,21
 - 8. Eph. 2:11-22
- B. But then there is how things seem to be in this world
 - 1. The problem isn't with God
 - 2. Problem is man
 - a) we rebel
 - b) we get at odds with each other
 - c) we think we know better than God
 - d) we get tempted, self-centered, proud, and rowdy
 - e) we offend
 - f) when offended, we do things we shouldn't
 - g) And turn God's perfect church into perfect chaos

C. Last week...

- 1. Remember God made us into a family
- 2. Let love cover a multitude of sins give the other person the benefit of the doubt
- 3. What not to do...
 - a) Change congregations or (worse) churches
 - b) Gossip
 - c) Grumble
 - d) Revenge Plan a coup / take over
 - e) Stay away
- 4. Division was never Jesus' answer to disagreement

II. WHAT TO DO...

- A. Pray
 - 1. Often bringing our conflicts before the Lord, brings things into sharper, clearer focus
 - 2. May find that there's really nothing to reconcile
- B. Go talk with your brother (Matt. 5:23ff & Matt. 18:15) in private

- 1. Humbly
- 2. Whether you are offended or the offender, you need to make the first move!
- 3. It doesn't matter that you don't like confrontation
- C. Use a soft voice
 - 1. Prov. 15:1 "A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger."
 - 2. It keeps the conversation civil and rational
- D. Deal with each other as a brother or sister (even leaders)
 - 1. Remember we're family (Eph. 2:19)
 - 2. Talk to each other not employees, not as "them"
 - 3. With appropriate care and compassion
- E. Take another person with you
 - 1. As witness (Matt. 18:16)
 - 2. Helps keep things in perspective
 - 3. May help put an objective finger on the real sticking point (1 Cor. 6:5)
- F. Bring it to the elders
 - 1. To the church (Matt. 18:17)
 - 2. God gave them to the church for many reasons, but one of them is to help with conflict
 - 3. If serious enough, let them discipline
- G. Choose to be wronged rather than hurt or divide the church
 - 1. The Corinthian church had serious enough conflict that some were bringing it to civil courts
 - 2. In such extreme cases Paul plea with the brethren, "Why not rather be wronged? Why not rather be defrauded?" (1 Cor. 6:7b)
- H. If it is a conscience matter (different from a "billy goat" problem), do not allow your preference cause a brother to sin
 - 1. Limiting my own liberty is sometimes important to unity
 - 2. 1 Cor. 8:11-13
- Let God be the final arbiter
 - 1. Sometimes preferences and opinions become so strong that we regard them as commands and try to strong-arm or manipulate others to conform
 - 2. Jesus criticized Pharisees for this (Mark 7:6-8)
 - 3. Let's God's word be final always
- J. Confess, repent, and forgive
 - 1. VERY important
 - 2. "Yes, I did this, and I shouldn't have."
 - 3. "I will stop doing that."

4. "And I forgive you."
