Revelation 3:14-22

14 "To the angel of the church in Laodicea write: The Amen, the faithful and true Witness, the Beginning of the creation of God, says this:

LETTER TO THE CHURCH IN LAODICEA

A little history — Laodicea was established in 250 BC by Antiochus II and named after his wife Laodicē. Several ancient cities named Laodicea in the ancient world, so this one was often known as Laodicea by the Lycus River.

Situated on the crossroads of three major merchant routes, Laodicea was an important commercial hub. It hosted a thriving banking sector, a luxury clothing manufacturing industry (rich purple/black wool of local sheep), and medical centers known for eye and ear remedies. It was, in comparison to most cities of the time, rich. In fact, in the early first century, when a devastating earthquake destroyed the city (and many others in the area) and the Roman government offered to help finance them to rebuild, Laodicea respectfully refused and rebuilt the city on their own.

Nearby, uphill to the north, was Heiropolis, famous for its hot mineral spring spas; the cliffs to the south are white with mineral deposits. The hot springs, of course ran downhill toward Laodicea, and by the time it water reached Laodicea, it was was tepid and mineral laden and unpleasant for drinking.

Laodicea is also mentioned in Col. 4:16,17 regarding circular letters to be read by all, and an exhortation to Archippus to pay attention to his ministry.
