I. THE TRUMPETS (CHAPTERS 8:2—11:19)

- A. The prayers of the saints symbolized in a burning censor thrown to the earth
- B. 1st Trumpet hail, fire, blood destroying trees and grass
- C. 2nd Trumpet burning mountain thrown into the sea, killing sea life
- D. 3rd Trumpet star falls from heaven on fresh waters, poisoning them
- E. 4th Trumpet sun and stars are darkened
- F. An angels announcing the three woes of the remaining trumpets ("Woe, woe, woe!")
 - 5th Trumpet (also 1st woe) bottomless pit opened, freeing (probably) demons to torment men, overseen by the angel of the Abyss, Abaddon or Apollyon (destruction) — (chapter 9)
 - 6th Trumpet (also the 2nd woe) a vast army kills much of mankind by the fire, smoke, and brimstone from their mouths to prompt repentance
 - a) Strong angel with the little book, (chapter 10)
 - (1) Cries out with a loud voice, answered by 7 thunders (to be sealed)

- (2) Swears that at the voice of the 7th angel the mystery of God is finished
- (3) John commanded to eat the book, which is sweet to the taste but bitter to the stomach
- b) Measuring the "Temple of God",
 - (1) leaving out the court (of gentiles?);
 - (2) the nations tread underfoot the holy city for 3 ½ years
- c) The two witnesses (chapter 11)
 - (1) prophesy for 3 ¹/₂ years (1260 days)
 - (2) The Beast kills them, bodies unburied for 3 ¹/₂ days
 - (3) Raised to life, the world fears
 - (4) The 2nd woe is past
- 3. 7th trumpet (angel) sounds (the third woe)
 - a) Loud voices say, "The kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of our Lord and of His Christ and He will reign forever and ever."
 - b) time for the dead to be judged and reward Your servants
 - c) the Temple in Heaven is opened

PREFACE TO CHAPTERS 10 AND 11

As we approach chapters 10 and 11, we need to remember a few details from as far back as Rev. 8:13.

Four trumpets were blown with their accompanying judgments on unbelieving mankind, and then we saw an eagle in mid-heaven saying "Woe, woe, woe..." regarding the three remaining trumpets, which become three "woes". The fifth trumpet is the first woe (see Rev. 9:12); the sixth trumpet is the second woe, which continues until 11:14 announces, "The second woe is past..." The announcement of the second woe being past "bookends" the contents of the sixth trumpet, which would include the visions of the strong angel, the seven thunders', the eating of the little book, the measuring of the temple and the two witnesses.

Some commentators want to clump chapters 10 through 17 together (some even farther) as one block belonging to the prophet contents of the "little book" — a lot of prophecy for a little book.

Revelation 10

¹ I saw another strong angel coming

down out of heaven, clothed with a cloud; and the rainbow was upon his head, and his face was like the sun, and his feet like pillars of fire; ² and he had in his hand a little book which was open. He placed his right foot on the sea and his left on the land; 3 and he cried out with a loud voice, as when a lion roars; and when he had cried out, the seven peals of thunder uttered their voices. 4 When the seven peals of thunder had spoken, I was about to write; and I heard a voice from heaven saying, "Seal up the things which the seven peals of thunder have spoken and do not write them." 5 Then the angel whom I saw standing on the sea and on the
