PAUL'S LETTERS TO TIMOTHY



Introduction

Written by Paul to Timothy in Ephesus approximately AD 64. Paul is not writing from prison, but rather he has left for Macedonia and has left Timothy to address a list of tasks for the benefit of the church.

Purpose: to set things in order in the church in Ephesus. This included shutting down false teachers, appointing elders and deacons in the church, instructions for personal growth, instructions for order in the worship assembly, the administration of benevolence to widows, the permissibility of financial support for local leaders, moral support of local leaders, and the importance of keeping the faith and doctrine of the church unaltered by false teachers. It is possible and even probable that when Paul says he left Timothy in Ephesus to straighten out some false teachers, that he wasn't just including Ephesus. There is a good chance that the seven churches of Asia were all established by Paul or some of his proxy evangelists sent out from Ephesus. We know, for example, that Paul personally knew the preacher in Colossae (Archippus, Col. 4:17), the church in Laodicea (Col. 4:15,16), and one of Colossae's members (Philemon). It is beyond doubt, for example, that the church in Ephesus already had elders by the time Paul wrote 1 Timothy, because Acts 20 speaks of him calling the Ephesian elders to himself at Miletus for a farewell address. Thus, Paul's instructions to Timothy about appointing elders and deacons would seem almost certainly to apply to elders and deacons in other cities.

1 Timothy 1

- ³ As I urged you upon my departure for Macedonia, remain on at Ephesus so that you may instruct certain men not to teach strange doctrines, 4 nor to pay attention to myths and endless genealogies, which give rise to mere speculation rather than furthering the administration of God which is by faith. 5 But the goal of our instruction is love from a pure heart and a good conscience and a sincere faith. ⁶ For some men, straying from these things, have turned aside to fruitless discussion, 7 wanting to be teachers of the Law, even though they do not understand either what they are saying or the matters about which they make confident assertions.
- ⁸ But we know that the Law is good, if one uses it lawfully, ⁹ realizing the fact that law is
